<b>Fachliches Profil:</b>	Politikwissenschaft mit Schwerpunkt in vergleichender Politikwissenschaft oder internationaler Politik und einem Fokus auf Deutschland und Europa, insbesondere in den Bereichen Immigration, Populismus und Europäische Union.
<b>Lehraufgaben:</b>	Drei Kurse pro Jahr (2 Kurse im Undergraduate Bereich, 1 Kurs im Graduiertenbereich). Die inhaltliche Gestaltung hängt von den wissenschaftlichen Schwerpunkten des/der Kandidaten/in ab  Aktive Mitarbeit bei Planung und Organisation kulturpolitischer Aktivitäten der Gasthochschule zur Vermittlung eines zeitgemäßen Deutschlandbildes
<b>Voraussetzungen:</b>	Abgeschlossene Promotion; einschlägige wissenschaftliche Veröffentlichungen; mehrjährige Lehrerfahrung; sehr gute Englischkenntnisse; Staatsangehörigkeit eines EU-Mitgliedsstaats
<b>Beginn:</b>	September 2020
<b>Dauer:</b>	Besetzung zunächst für die Dauer von zwei Jahren, mit Verlängerungsmöglichkeit

Die Beschreibung der jeweiligen Position formuliert die Gasthochschule im *DAAD Professorship Questionnaire* wie folgt:

**INFORMATION DESCRIBING THE POSITION AND FUNCTIONS OF THE DAAD PROFESSOR**

a) Length of initial appointment, renewability:

**Initial appointment for two years, with annual reviews and the possibility of renewal for up to five years.**

b) Status of the appointee (assistant guest professor, associate guest professor, guest professor):

**Visiting Assistant Professor.**

c) Disciplinary field and areas of specialization and sub-specialization preferred:

**Political science, with a specialization in comparative or international politics and a focus on European affairs. We are particularly interested in the politics of immigration, populism, and the European Union, but also welcome scholars who work on political institutions, comparative or international political economy, and European culture, political thought, and history.**

d) Desired qualifications of the DAAD Professor:

**Ph.D. and teaching experience required, along with a demonstrated record of research excellence. Expertise in quantitative research methods is highly desirable but not essential, including, for example, econometrics, game theory, text analysis, and big data methods.**

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e) What is the regular course load the DAAD Professor will be expected to carry per academic year?

**The standard teaching load in the department is three courses per year.**

f) To what extent will research focus and academic specialization of the DAAD Professor be given weight in designing course topics? To what extent will the DAAD Professor be expected to teach within an established curriculum? What are likely course topics to be assigned to the DAAD Professor?

**We expect that the DAAD professor will teach one undergraduate lecture course dealing with contemporary German politics and another lecture course dealing with contemporary European affairs. The professor will be given a great deal of discretion in designing these courses. We expect other courses to reflect the professor's research interests and academic specialization. At least one course will be an advanced senior/graduate student seminar (4000/6000 level) in a topical area related to the professor's research expertise.**

g) Will courses taught by the DAAD Professor be eligible for cross-listing with other units of the host institution?

**Yes, cross-listing with German Studies and/or other academic units (such as History, Sociology, etc.) will be possible.**

h) Ratio and level of graduate and undergraduate courses the DAAD Professor will be expected to teach:

**Two courses would be taught each year at the undergraduate level, and one course would be taught at the graduate level.**

i) Estimated number of students expected to enroll in the courses taught by the DAAD Professor:

**Undergraduate lecture courses typically enroll between 30 and 50 students. Undergraduate seminars enroll up to 15 students. Graduate seminars typically enroll 7-10 students.**

j) Additional duties and activities expected of the DAAD Professor within and outside the university (e.g. local and regional outreach activities, fostering of a more productive relationship with German institutions and the German scholarly community):

**There are no additional formal requirements, but we hope the DAAD professor will be an active member of the Government Department as well as the larger scholarly community at Cornell. Previous DAAD professors have regularly worked with undergraduate students on their honors theses; provided methodological tutoring for graduate students; participated in seminars, workshops and conferences sponsored by the Government Department and by CIES and the Institute for German Cultural Studies; and contributed to the outreach activities of the CIES and other programs at Cornell. In addition, our DAAD professors have been a key resource for undergraduate and graduate students undertaking field research in Germany and Europe.**
